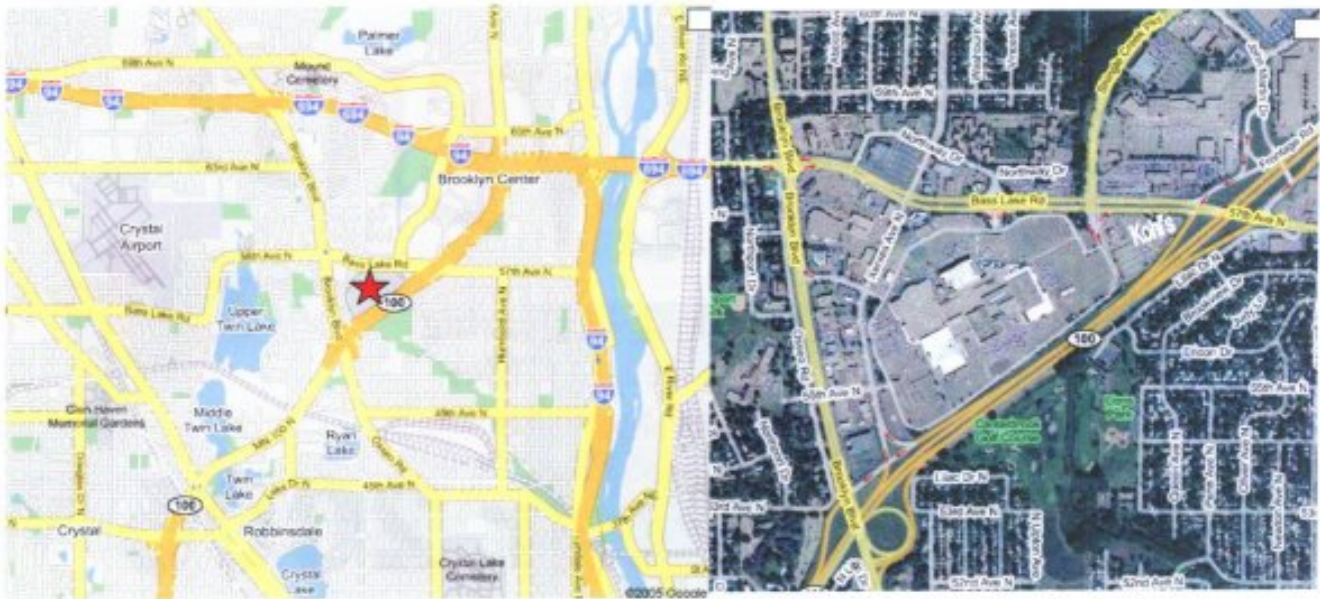

Orlando, FL Nat. Convention Report

Hi Everyone,

I just returned from the Hearing Loss Assoc. of America convention in Orlando this afternoon. I had a wonderful time.

I left with my friend Colleen Wednesday evening 6/28 from MSP via Northwest. We got to our hotel rooms at the resort after Midnight. Thursday, after we registered, we left for Epcot to participate in a small experiment for Disney and their handheld captioned wireless receiver they plan to use later this year. I hope they slow down their speed of the captions since deaf or hard of hearing people cannot understand tapes or intercoms or anything that is not captioned (and most deaf and hard of hearing people can read). Otherwise, we had a good time at Epcot. We returned to the Convention Center in time to hear the keynote speaker, Lou Ferrigno, who starred as "The incredible Hulk" many years ago. He said his life began after 40 and I plan to finish his book soon. Did you know he lost over 80% of his hearing at a very young age?. I had my picture taken with him afterwards. My three favorite workshops were I attended were: "The Emotional Impact of Hearing Loss" "Bilateral cochlear implants - To Do or not to do?" & "Superman & Wonderwoman do not Live Here Anymore, How Ordinary People face the challenge of Hearing Loss when one spouse is hearing and the other has a hearing loss." I also saw the huge exhibit hall with many vendors dealing cochlear implants, cell phones, hearing aids, CapTel, How to start an ALDA chapter (Adult Late Deafness Association), etc. I bought a Sidekick T-Mobile 2. I attended the Mexican buffet dinner, saw the premiere movie screening in downtown Disney, called "Superman Returns" that was close-captioned. Now I need to read all the earlier

books and maybe see videos of the earliest Superman so it all makes sense to me. A lot of us attended the annual banquet on Sat. with speaker and author Michael Chorost about being hooked up to a CI after 30 years of deafness. Now, we are really bionic machines.

Next year, I may try to go to the cochlear implant convention instead of the HLAA since I no longer wear hearing aids.

Thank you for praying that I would have an enjoyable time. I certainly did.

BITS AND PIECES

Bring your old **hearing aids and eye glasses** to the Oct. meeting so they can be recycled and used by others.

I am happy to say that we are a thriving group of people with no shortage of ideas to keep us going.

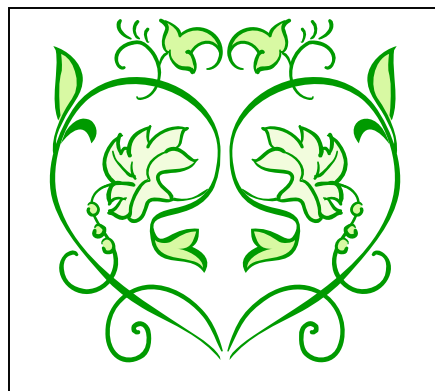

Pidgin Sign

Most of us at HLAA-TC know at least a few ASL signs. But knowing a few signs – even knowing a great many signs – is not the same as knowing ASL.

We use ASL not so much as a language in itself, but as a supplement to the language we already know. What is it we do with ASL when we treat it this way? Mangle it, I suppose. Like the fractured French of my youth, my attempts to use the shards of a language I am struggling to learn might be called “splintered Sign”. But since I actually *need* these fragments of visible language, it seems worthy of a less flippant name.

Now, at last, I have a term for it: Pidgin Sign. I didn’t make this up. Linguist Steven Pinker (The Language Instinct, 1994) describes a pidgin as “choppy strings of words borrowed from the language ...highly variable in order and with little in the way of grammar.” Sounds a lot like my use of ASL.

“Shall we go back to work?”, I’ll ask, signing “work” with a questioning look (or maybe one of sad resignation), but no visible grammar whatever. Because my companion is also listening, she knows I didn’t say “I don’t like my job”, or “I do bad work.” As we converse we watch one another’s faces, read lips, listen for any sounds we can hear, and bolster it all with a few key signs.

Why do we do this? Pinker says that pidgins arise “when speakers of different languages have to communicate to carry out practical tasks, but do not have the opportunity to learn one another’s languages”. And signs do serve a very practical function for us, even if we are not able to convey a complete and complex idea in ASL. They can help us find the topic, change the direction of the conversation, or learn what activity is next. Like the creators of spoken pidgins, we need to communicate but we lack the opportunity to fully learn the language.

Most of our conversations are with hearing people, and unless that changes, we will continue to lack the opportunity to learn ASL in its full grammatical form. We must speak to be understood by most of the hearing population, so we are not able to abandon English and immerse ourselves fully in ASL.

Is that a bad thing? Not necessarily. Echoing the HLAA philosophy (Terry Portis, Hearing Loss Journal July/August 2005) of “whatever works”, I would claim that ASL’s usefulness authorizes us to include it in our communications arsenal. It can’t hurt -- though I think we owe it to ASL “natives” to make sure we don’t represent our manual jabberings as the ASL language.

Even Franglais wasn’t all bad. I was, after all, practicing my vocabulary, syntax, declensions, grammar – I just wasn’t practicing them all at the same time.

In the interest of “whatever works”, I’d say, if it helps, do it. You might even learn the ASL language some time. After all, I did eventually learn French.

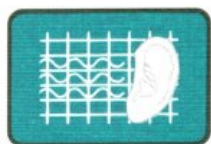
