

## Hearing Loss for Dummies

Shouldn't we have a book by that title? After all, it stands to reason that, with the glut of dummies we apparently have in our world, some of them might want to know about hearing loss. Some of them, for that matter, might *have* hearing loss. (Why are you all looking at me?).

We have "DOS for Dummies", "Dogs for Dummies", "Latin for Dummies" (I actually have that one, but it is too complicated for me) – you name it, the dummies have it. I truly realized how pervasive this dummy culture is when, on one of our bookstore dates, my husband remarked that he'd found just the book I need: "Cooking for Dummies". (I didn't need it, I told him, since I'd been cooking for dummies for 30 years.)

But suppose someone actually undertook to write such a book. What should be in it?

Well, to start with, maybe it would be a good idea to explain how someone born with bad ears can have "hearing loss". According to the gurus of political correctness, we aren't "hard of hearing", and we aren't "hearing impaired". We have "hearing loss". So tell me, how can you lose something you never had? Wait a minute, I'll ask my mother. She's convinced that it's possible (for me, at least) to lose *anything*.

And we are also not supposed to refer to people as "the deaf", or "the hard of hearing", but to preface such descriptions with "people", ie: "people who are deaf", or "people who have hearing loss", no doubt so we don't confuse

those who may think we are talking about, say, hard of hearing chipmunks. But leaving out the "people who are" phrase doesn't normally confuse anyone when we are talking about other groups. For example, it would be correct to say that I am a member of these groups:

The musically inclined  
The technologically challenged  
The gainfully employed  
The intelligent

Oh, all right, maybe that isn't *quite* correct. But it is politically correct. Nobody would take you to task for leaving out "people who are". The "people who are" phrase is understood, and need not always be stated. In literary circles, this is known as "ellipsis". Don't make me go there.

And then I'd like someone to explain why people aren't supposed to call me "handicapped," but it's OK for them to say I have a disability. Unless someone has been tampering with my Webster's Collegiate recently, a disability is still "an inability to pursue an occupation because of...impairment". Now, I would be first to admit that I don't hear very well, but I have just never figured out how that is a disability. It hasn't stopped me – or any of you – from pursuing an occupation.

It is, however, a big handicap, and I would just as soon that people knew that. A handicap is simply "a disadvantage that makes achievement unusually difficult". You bet! I think people should know that listening is hard, and if I don't know what they said, it isn't because I don't care. If they understand my difficulty, people may be more forgiving. Otherwise, they might think I'm rude, or a snob, or maybe even one of those... dummies!

## HLAA TC Meeting 10/21/06

For our first official meeting, the agenda was very full. Besides the usual business items, we had two outstanding speakers. More than 30 people attended.

President Merrilee called us all to order promptly at 10AM.

Dora Weber welcomed multiple guests whom we would very much like to join us as members. We also added 3 brand new members to our list: Jon Skaalen, Patrick Coninx and Anita Jandl. A heartfelt welcome to you all from your new friends!

What a treat to see Mary Hartnett from the MCDHH, an ardent advocate for all of us. Mary is also a staunch supporter of the message of our first speaker **Trudy Suggs**. Trudy is the Vice-President of MADC (Minnesota Association of Deaf Citizens) and serves on the Governor's Commission for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (MCDHH). In order to learn more about Trudy, you can "Google" her by typing in her name. I was duly impressed by her multiple credentials.

Trudy talked to us about the importance of VOTING. She passionately encouraged all of us to become involved in the political process. We need to learn about the issues that concern us. Who actually are our State representatives in the House and in the Senate? Well, we all failed that test! Or were we all just too shy to answer!!? Considering that there are more than 400,000 people in Minnesota with hearing loss, what a difference we could make!

Trudy pointed out multiple obstacles that discourage people with hearing disabilities from voting: lack of accessibility, not understanding the issues - often due to lack of captioning, transportation problems etc. In the end however, the message was clear: YOUR VOTE

IS YOUR VOICE. If needed, ask for help but do get involved!

Next, **Larry Wigfield** from the *Minnesota Operation Lifesaver* instructed us on train safety and the disadvantages that hearing disabled people have in this regard. Larry visits the Faribault school for the hearing disabled on a yearly basis. We must teach our kids about train safety. No trespassing onto railroad property. No walking on the rails. Trains now run on smooth welded track that eliminates virtually all vibrations, so deaf and hard of hearing people cannot "feel" the approach of a train.

At a train crossing, look both ways before proceeding. An "X" bar is the same as a yield sign. Beware that one train can hide another. Driving around gates is a huge no-no, a law violation that draws a heavy fine. Many accidents happen because people misjudge the speed of oncoming trains. A freight train moving at 55mph takes 1 to 1 ½ miles to stop! Never underestimate the emotional toll on the train engineers in case of accidents. We thank Larry for this most informative talk and wish him success in his efforts of saving lives.

Officers' notices were kept to a minimum. President Merrilee invited us to write to the FCC and voice our opinion regarding further exemptions of closed captioning. Consult page 10 of the October paper on this issue.

In closing, some great news from treasurer Bob: we have money in the bank. We would like more, so let's pick up tickets to sell for the steak fry in April.

Thanks again to PARADIGM for making our meeting communication accessible to all with CART. As always, what a marvelous job!

## MEET HENRY

Henry and his brother Spencer attended the AWARE Fair at Brookdale and stopped to Chat with Bob at our booth. His Mom, Jackie, was kind enough to tell Bob more about this happy guy.

Henry was born August 22, 2005. At the point Henry and I were being discharged from the hospital a nurse told me that Henry had not passed his new-born hearing screening and that we should follow-up with our pediatrician. I called our pediatrician right away and by the time Henry was five days old we had our first appointment with the audiologist. That began the journey of Henry's first year...Henry has severe to profound bilateral, sensorineural hearing loss. Henry had hearing aids (provided by the Lion's) at three months old. Though the hearing aids did not benefit his situation, various screening and testing determined he was a good candidate for Cochlear Implant. At nine months-old (in May of 2006) he had Cochlear Implant surgery on his right ear at the University of Minnesota. The implant was hooked up in June and Henry has been showing more and more reaction to the sounds around him. As special education and speech therapy continue I am sure Henry will amaze us more each day.

## HELP! I'm losing my hearing!

Well, actually that's been happening for the past 40 years for me, so that's old news. What is occurring now is that I am *literally* losing my hearing . . . . aids. The past couple of months they become so loose that I am constantly pushing and re-pushing them back where they are supposed to be. Add to that more electronic feedback, and I've got an annoying situation. Why was this happening when they are less than a year old?

This was brought to the forefront one recent day at the post office. I was conducting my business with the nice post-office lady, but she kept staring at my right ear. Knowing that some people's eyes do tend to stray towards hearing aids, I tugged my hair down over my ear in an effort to hide the device and let the post-office lady converse with me, not with my ear. After concluding my business, I turned away, and caught myself in a reflection. Lo and behold, there's my right hearing aid, dangling in a tangle of my hair, completely 'uninstalled' from where it should be! Oh my!

After a call to my audiologist, I found that the most common reason for this is when the wearer loses weight. Having recently shed 14 pounds, this was an "ah-HAH!" moment for me. Although 14 pounds is not a 'lot' of weight, those of you that know me understand that this is a significant portion of my size 6 frame.

I had no idea that weight loss can affect the fit of hearing aid earmolds. Not only does it affect the fit, but looser hearing aids can cause more whistle and feedback. No wonder I've been miserable. So, keep in mind next time you're on the treadmill – one of the many rewards for losing weight can be a trip to see your friendly audiologist for new earmolds. Don't go 'losing it' the way I did!

RE: Board of Trustees Meeting

Today, we announce with much regret and pain that after serious deliberation in a special, all-day Executive Session of the Board of Trustees, we have voted to terminate Dr. Fernandes' appointment as President-Designate (currently effective) and President (effective beginning January 1, 2007) at Gallaudet University.

We understand the impact of this decision and the important issues that inherently arise when a Board re-examines decisions in the face of an on-going protest. The Board believes that it is in the best interests of the University to terminate Dr. Fernandes from the incoming President's position. Although undoubtedly there will be some members of the community who have differing views on the meaning of this decision, we believe that it is a necessity at this point. The Board is continuing to meet to discuss transitional issues.

It has certainly been a difficult and trying time for our Gallaudet community. Now is the time for healing. The hope of the Board of Trustees is for our beloved community to come together to work for a stronger and better Gallaudet.

The Sound Smoothing feature recognizes and reduces annoying noises like rustling paper, clanging dishes, and breaking glass while preserving the sound of voices and conversations. The hearing aid has a directional microphone system, feedback reduction or elimination, and a wind noise reduction system.

I hear that Oticon's new Delta hearing aid has been a hot seller. It's a triangular wedge less than an inch long and very light in weight. It is surprising that so much can now be packed in such a small device. It comes in 17 different colors, not one of them the ubiquitous "flesh". . What is different and encouraging is that Delta buyers seem to be showing a trend to get help for their hearing loss earlier because it is small and trendy. 
