

Synopsis for March 18, 2006

Joe opened with the info. about the Aware Fair being the same day as our general meeting, Sept. 16th, and perhaps we should cancel our general mtg.

Bob Knoll welcomed the new guests and returning guests; Steve, Monique, Ross, Mary, Jeanette, Marlene, and William. He then moved onto the steak fry saying we are doing good in sales.

Secretary Lori asked people to sign up for the May potluck picnic. She asked us to bring up ideas of speakers and told of a person who spoke at her work place, that she will try to get to come to SHHH. She was a hostage on a plane 20 yrs. ago and shot in the head. Lori mentioned the card for Cliff and the distribution of magazines to the Vets Hospital or elsewhere, more volunteers are needed.

Spot light speaker was Hollynd Turley who comes from a large family, and 4 of her family are hard of hearing. One sister is having a CI. Hollynd works in the nursery at her church. She works downtown at Ameriprise Financial during the week. She is able to use regular phones with an amplifier, and she has a cell phone from T-mobile.


Our guest speaker was Mary Hartnett, head of Metropolitan Council for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (MCDHH). She works tirelessly for our advocacy at the Judicial, state, house and senate levels. MCDHH has been around since 1985, and Bonham Cross was one of the first executive directors. She said on average there are 4000 bills to consider each yr., but only about 1000 get passed, all of ours last year got passed. They were about new schools and acoustics standards, hearing aid rules sellers must follow, restoration of funds for the MN Employment Center among others.

“I understand that a lot of you think that government doesn’t have a lot to do with your lives, but if you don’t have a relationship with your legislator, you, don’t know how much power you have. Legislators have told me, Matt Entenza, who is the house minority leader, and same with speaker Sviggum who is the speaker of the house, have said, when they hear from 4 constituents, they think that’s a big deal. I mean because so few people contact them oftentimes, that that has an impact on them. They want to get reelected. They are there to serve you, so you have a lot more power than you think.”

Some questions were asked; why does financial aid seem to go to only those attending Gallaudet, if the telephone surcharge for equipment has a surplus is there a termination point where it is turned into the general fund, how do you find who your reps. are? Mary gave answers to all these and more at the meeting.

Mary handed out bills being worked on this session to our members.



IF A DISASTER HAPPENS, ARE YOUR READY?

SUPPOSE: A bad flu spreads through our state, an attack by terrorists, or our city has a big flood would you know what to do or how to get help?

If something like the above happens, the State Emergency Operation Center (SEOC) will open. The SEOC will have hotline phone numbers for you to call to get help or information. Put these numbers on your refrigerator so you can quickly find them. Also, copy the numbers on a piece of paper and put them in your wallet/purse.

Sample Emergency Kit Supplies

- **Water**
- **Food, at least a 3 day supply of nonperishable food (beef jerky, granola bars, canned food etc.)**
- **Non – electric can opener for food**
- **Battery powered radio and extra batteries**
- **Flashlight and extra batteries**
- **First Aid kit**
- **Whistle to signal for help**
- **Dust mask or cotton t-shirt to help filter air**
- **Moist towelettes for sanitation**
- **Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities**
- **Plastic sheeting and duct tape**
- **Unique family needs, prescription meds, glasses or contact lenses, infant formula, diapers, pet food/supplies, canes (if Deafblind) etc.**
- **Important family documents (in waterproof bag)**
- **Garbage bags and plastic ties, for personal sanitation**
- **Cash**
- **Headlamp**

- Hearing aid or cochlear implant batteries
- Batteries and charger for pagers
- Car charger for pager
- Notepad and pen for communication
- Portable TTY and batteries
- Communication Plan


Editors Note: I would also suggest these items.

- A list of all your prescriptions, doses, all doctors names and phone numbers, time of day taken.
- Contact phone numbers and addresses of people you can call to let them know you are OK.
- Check your items from time to time for expiration dates


