Reserve the 3rd Saturday of each month from Sept. through May for the HLAA –TC meeting. Your officers are working hard to make the meetings interesting and informative for you.

Co-president Linda Miller opened the meeting, inviting participants to coffee and free information on the tables.

Co-president Carole then introduced Linda Miller, an active member and Board member, as our speaker. Her topic, "How to talk, and not to talk, to Hard of Hearing People," based on Sam Tychin's material. She met him at a Milwaukee conference; he is a Clinical Psychologist and has a hearing loss. The information she provided from his books and talks focus on surviving and communicating in our world.

Rule 1. Look for areas in noisy situations that help us hear more adequately.

Rule 2. Anticipate situations beforehand and find the best area for your hearing needs.

Rule 3. Tell others how best to address and talk to you.

Rule 4. It is our responsibility to educate others.

Rule 5. We need to pay attention to the speaker.

Rule 6. Ask for written clues of keywords if needed.

Rule 7. Clarify plans and directions.

Rule 8. Do not bluff and pretend to hear.

Rule 9. Arrange for breaks if discussion is long.

Rule 10. Provide speaker feedback positively.

Rule 11. Do not interrupt too much.

Rule 12. Set realistic expectation goals for understanding.



Next, came Communication Rules for Speaking to H.O.H. persons

Rule 1. Get their attention first.

Rule 2. Keep face clear of obstacles.

Rule 3. Do not have objects in mouth.

Rule 4. Speak clearly at a moderate pace.

Rule 5. Use facial expressions and gestures.

Rule 6. Give clues when changing subjects.

Rule 7. Rephrase, if not understood first time.

Rule 8. Don't shout.

Rule 9. Avoid noisy backgrounds

Rule 10. Be patient, positive and relaxed

Rule 11. Talk to person, not about them.

Rule 12. If in doubt, ask for suggestions to improve communication.



A video of the correct and incorrect way to address many different situations that we all face in our daily lives was shown, it was by Sam Trychin. Twenty vignettes offered much discussion on each one and many ideas were brought out that were very helpful.

Correction:

I, Candi Meinders, have a few corrections from my member spotlight. I lost my hearing at 6 years old from chicken pox, scarlet fever, or measles. My parents did not take me to a specialist till I was in the 7th grade and I was fitted with my first aids soon afterwards. Partly because of peer pressure, I only wore them during 7th grade and I did not wear them again till 27 years of age for about 29 days because that was all I could afford then. I resumed wearing aids again when I was 34 years of age and wore them 8 1/2 years until I obtained my first cochlear implant at the U of M in 2002.

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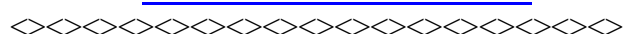

The TED Program has been distributing a big button, easy-to-use, amplified cell phone as part of their inventory. If a Minnesota resident qualifies for the TED Program, the phone will be provided at no cost to the client but the client is responsible to pay (what I would consider reasonable) the service plan. The service plan includes no contracts, no early termination fees, free activation fee, operator assistance, live nurse, voicemail and car charger and leather case. Either a landline or wireless cell phone can be selected, unless the client needs both devices for health or emergency reasons. Blue Ear

From the *New York Daily News*, May 26, 2012

Four year old Anthony Smith of New Hampshire didn't want to use his hearing aid, telling his mom that superheroes don't wear them. She emailed Marvel Comics when he wouldn't wear them to school.

Editor Bill Rosemann of Marvel, who has a 3-year old son, got to thinking what they could do to show that superheroes do wear hearing aids. "Maybe we can create a superhero that will make him feel good about wearing his hearing aid," Rosemann told The Daily News.

Rosemann first sent the Anthony's mom a comic book cover of Hawkeye, a member of the Avengers who lost his hearing. He also forwarded her email to some of Marvel's artists, who pitched in to create *Blue Ear*, a superhero whose distinctive listening device gives him supersonic hearing. The hearing device lets him hear "an ant hiccup on the other side of the country," Nelson Ribeiro, Blue Ear's co-creator, told CBS News HealthPop.

"The Blue Ear, along with the other superheroes of Inter-C.O.M., who are all special needs children, have banded together to use their newfound powers to fight crime and teach the world that no matter who you are, everyone has a hero inside of them."

"Thanks to my listening device, I hear someone in trouble," Blue Ear exclaims below in an otherwise inaudible cry for help.

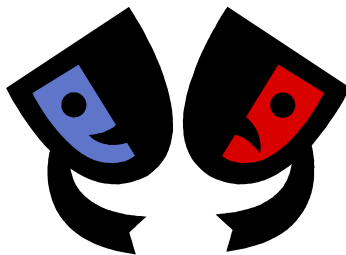
The company's gesture already has achieved the important goal that started it. Anthony now wants to wear his hearing aid "to fight bad guys and help people."

Plan now to participate in the 2012 Walk 4 Hearing. The Minneapolis Walk will be held on September 29, 2012 at Lake Calhoun. The national 2012 fundraising goal is \$1.3 million. The Minneapolis W4H goal is \$40,000. Funds raised are shared between national and local HLAA .

There are many ways to be involved in HLAA's Walk4Hearing.

The Hearing Loss Association of America's (HLAA) Walk4Hearing is the largest walk of its kind in the country that raises awareness and helps to eradicate the stigma associated with hearing loss. HLAA's Walk4Hearing is held in multiple cities across the country. Since 2006, over 26,000 walkers have stepped up and helped raise money for programs and services for people with hearing loss and their families. Money raised is shared between the national organization and local Walk sites. Examples of how funds are used include:

National Programs and Services

- Provides timely and reliable information about hearing loss through its website, *Hearing Loss Magazine*, the online e-News, the Hearing Loss Support Specialists Training, message boards/chat forums, monthly webinars and holds annual conventions
- Works at the national level to affect legislation that impacts people with hearing loss, whether it's funding for hearing aids and cochlear implants, communication access in public places, or other important issues
- A nationwide network of 200 chapters providing personal support and 14 state organizations advocating for expanded state services
- Support for parents of children with hearing loss at www.kidsandhearingloss.org
- Outreach to veterans returning with hearing loss
- Social networking site for young adults with hearing loss at www.hearinglossnation.org

Local Programs and Services

- Captioning and hearing assistive technology at HLAA chapter meetings to make them accessible
- Scholarships toward college tuition for students with hearing loss
- Funding for hearing aids and devices for people who cannot afford them
- Installation of hearing assistive technology in public places, such as community rooms and public libraries
- Captioning of live theater productions
- Seminars on coping with hearing loss for families

You may start your own team, or join with another team that is already formed, or walk as an individual. It is not mandatory that every walker on a team raise money for the Walk, but it is hoped that they will if they can. You may get support for the walk from your family, friends, neighbors, and/or coworkers.
