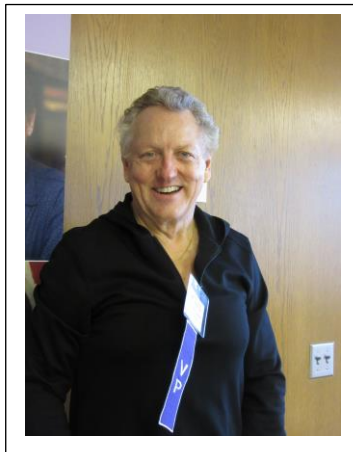

HLAA-TC April 16, 2016 Meeting Synopsis

President Christine Morgan called the meeting to order at 10 AM. She welcomed all those in attendance and introduced a Cochlear Implant Manufacturer panel, Julia Biedenstein, from Advanced Bionics, Jennifer Brown, from Cochlear and Christine Pett, from Med-El. Each person introduced their company credentials and brief history and then answered a list of prepared questions from President Christine Morgan who served as moderator of the panel.

Some of the prepared questions included advice to those considering a cochlear implant, common complaints from people who already have cochlear implants such as hearing in background noise and talking on the telephone, future trends in the industry, where each company differed on what their focus is, and then a discussion on hybrid devices.

Questions from the audience included insurance coverage for cochlear implants, and the criteria needed to obtain that coverage, Medicare coverage for a second implant, how well can music be heard with an implant, and what a person really hears after receiving an implant.

These questions prompted a lively discussion from the audience and the panel which then led to comments about age related hearing loss. Concluding remarks from the panel included having many conversations and tests with your audiologist, manage your expectations when considering implant surgery and do your research as ultimately the decision is in the hands of the consumer unlike many other forms of surgery.

After the break, Vicki Martin delivered the ASL Lesson on the alphabet and numbers; President Morgan reported on recent progress in advocacy for accommodation at local theaters including captioning and looping systems; Vice President Lionel reported on several legislative updates both State and Federal; called for nominations from the floor for the Board positions to be elected in May, and asked for volunteers to serve on our standing committees; and

Treasurer Marie delivered our financial report.

Marie also announced membership opportunities to help other groups in support of hearing loss including the Hero Walk for Kids in May, the Lions Walk in June, and of course the HLAA walk in September.

After fielding other questions from the audience about Facebook, blogs about hearing loss, and petition signing, President Morgan thanked those in attendance and then adjourned the meeting promptly at Noon.

Those of you familiar with the quaint town of Lanesboro might be familiar with the lovely B&Bs, biking, canoeing, camping, and the CommonWeal Theater. It is a small theater with some great offerings. We haven't been there for about three years but have enjoyed our four visits to the town.

I recently received their brochure for the upcoming season and noted with interest that they offer ASL and auditory assistance, but no captioning or looping, nor do they mention assistive listening devices.

I e-mailed the general manager asking about access and mentioning the 98% of those of us with hearing loss who do not sign and need access. I was amazed to get a response within 2 hours! They apologized and admitted that they were not aware and wanted to do something about it. Wow!

I provided them with information (including VSAs contact information), our website, and an offer for one or more of them to attend our meetings. They were very receptive and I will be interested to learn what their plans are.

On Home Theater Access

For the electronically inclined: (Kathy from Geneva Illinois describes a successful TV setup!)

When Gib and I were going together well over a half a century ago, we loved to go to drive-in movies because I could have the speaker right next to my right ear which was the ear that had the hearing aid and the best hearing. What we did was replicate that same experience in the house, so I can control volume right next to my ears, although I now wear two digital hearing aids which self adjust and have other programs, and I also have a pilot control.

You will notice two tan speakers on the table *[describing a photo of their family/TV room]* next to the couch. This is the side next to the fireplace which spans the entire wall of the family room, and they almost blend into the rocks. Although you can't see the end table, you can see two speakers. They are computer speakers with a volume control.

Across from the couch is a 55" flat screen TV. For many years I've had those speakers which are now connected into this TV. Erik and Gib ran the wires through the basement ceiling under the family room and up to the table and hooked up the speakers.

Today one can buy wireless speakers to put almost anywhere to enhance the hearing experience. But we don't need to do that since my wired speakers work extremely well.



CLOSE YOUR EYES AND CONCENTRATE (thoughts on distraction)

“Close your eyes now and just listen.” Have you ever been in the audience when a speaker asked you to do this? Maybe he even asked that the lights be turned out, so nobody could “cheat”.

But are the commands to close your eyes and to concentrate mutually exclusive? They are to people who don’t hear. When you close your eyes, you lose touch with what is going on around you. Your mind wanders. You may even fall asleep in the middle of a talk -- maybe even in a meeting. (Come to think of it, you don’t always need to close your eyes for that to happen!)

People often assume that closing your eyes will help you focus on the topic. But if you don’t understand what is being said, you lose your focus instead of increasing it. Yes, I speak from experience. Whether the speaker is live with you in the room or reaching out to you from a recording, you inevitably begin thinking about something else – or nothing at all.

I can offer a new perspective on this now: wearing a CI, I tune in to an online Sunday service on a snowy evening. I get comfortable in a chair as a resonant voice begins to speak. I close my eyes. To my surprise, my mind no longer wanders. I am more focused, more thoughtful than I am on Sunday morning with my eyes open.

OK, now I get it! Now I know why a presenter may occasionally ask the audience to close their eyes and listen. But, speakers, please don’t make this a mandate. Don’t be annoyed if I keep my eyes open, because in order to focus, you need to have something to focus *on*. If I can’t hear what you say, I don’t have that. So I look at you. Sometimes it’s the best I can do, so please accept it.

But when I *can* understand you – it’s wonderful to be able to enhance that focus with closed eyes. Thank you for reminding me!

Minneapolis Star/Tribune February 28, 2016 excerpted from article: "Kids not so good at blocking out noise to process speech"

Excerpts from the article: "Noise is more distracting to a child's brain than to an adult's...what a child hears in a noisy environment is not what an adult hears...they have a greater need for understanding speech around them but at the same time they're less equipped to deal with it...the ability to understand and process speech against competing background noise doesn't mature until adolescence...an adults' experienced brain automatically substitutes a logical choice...young children don't do this. St. Paul Pioneer Press, May 8, 2016 excerpted from "Dear Abby"

"Q: My handsome, intelligent, physically fit husband looks much younger than his age. But he is vain and won't get hearing aids. Because he can't hear, he stands looking at people with a faraway expression on his face that makes him appear like he has dementia. It takes him a while to process the spoken word, and then sometimes he gets it wrong...Any tips for me on how to deal with this?...He could easily afford to buy hearing aids.

A: What's going on is not only not good for your relationship with your husband, but also extremely isolating for him. I do have a suggestion for you. Discuss your concern with your family physician. Perhaps if the doctor suggests he have his hearing checked by an audiologist, your husband will be less likely to tune the message out. Advances in hearing aids are being made all the time, and some of them fit into the ear canal and are hard to detect."

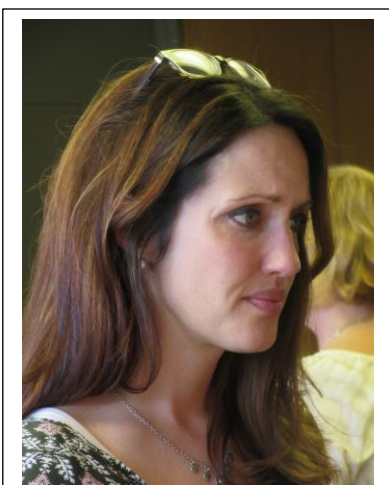
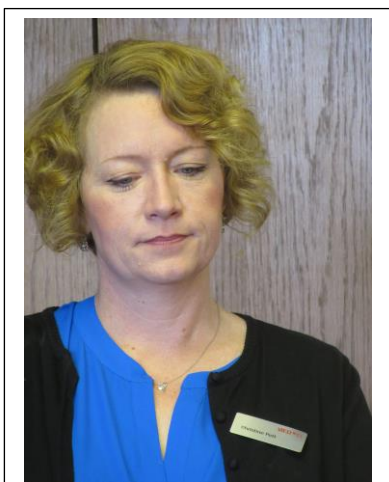
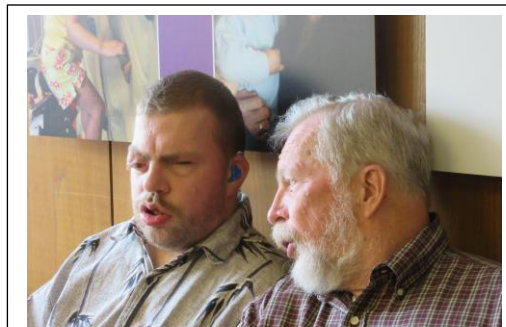
