

Meeting Summary January 20, 2018

Secretary Lionel Locke opened the meeting at 10 am and introduced our speaker, Emory David Dively, the Deputy Director of the Commission for Deaf, Deaf-Blind and Hard of Hearing Minnesotans. Emory provided information on what the Commission worked on last year, is working on now, and what their newly released legislative agenda contains.

Last year, the Commission lobbied to get a bill passed that stated that all State funded construction sites that have a meeting room designed for 15 or more people and has permanent sound amplification need to include a loop in that room. They also must have good acoustics. One of the goals of the Commission is to persuade people and organizations to buy into the importance of loops and acoustics and also to make sure that they are following the guidelines. As part of that goal, the Commission is working with Loop Minnesota and other people to develop a document to explain looping, another document for managers to know what to look for when hiring a contractor to install a loop, and another on conformity or how well the loop performs throughout the room and how well it meets international standards.

Another bill passed last year has to do with training of home care providers and staff in nursing homes and assisted living facilities. The Commission has developed a training curriculum with Peggy Nelson, PhD and some of her graduate students in the University of Minnesota's Speech, Language and Hearing Sciences Department. The training will be free and will count toward their continuing education requirements. A challenge has been how to make this training interesting and accessible to people with a wide range of education, plus deciding what needs to be included to understand how to communicate with a person with a hearing loss.

Another exciting (and expensive) activity is the development of a database of information on the number of Minnesotans with hearing loss, whether they do something about it (hearing aids, cochlear implants, ASL, etc.) and if not, why not. The Commission is doing both a phone survey (including cell phones) and contracting the Minnesota Department of Health to include these questions in their mandated survey. The goal is to have hard data to take to insurers and legislators

about the public health and financial consequences of hearing loss and the need to fund treatment of it.

Other things that the Commission is working on this year include: to increase the use of hearing aids and cochlear implants by developing an on-line hearing loss module for the State of Minnesota EAP program, since those employees have insurance that covers hearing loss treatment; increase public awareness for people with Medicaid and MinnesotaCare that hearing treatment is covered 100%; doing research on the return on investment of cochlear implants which are covered and hearing aids which are not covered to take to the legislators; to broaden the Telephone Equipment Distribution Program to possibly include personal sound amplification products and inexpensive assistive listening devices; renovating the very old School for the Deaf and Blind; and changing the structure of the Commission so that terms are 4 years rather than 3 and that Commissioners can stay on until their replacements have been appointed, which may take up to a year. Emory's presentation sparked many questions which he took the time to answer.

The Board members then presented on a variety of topics. Vice-President Kathleen Marin reported that a group of hard of hearing people from Japan contacted her and would like to meet with our HLAA chapter during the national conference in June to share stories and information about hearing loss in our two cultures.

Lionel Locke discussed volunteer opportunities at the national conference that will also give us a 25% discount on the registration fee. These 3 hour activities include registration, information desk, monitor at a presentation, ticket checker at the Mandy Harvey concert, etc. Lionel had registration forms available for anyone who wants to volunteer. He also clarified that people who volunteer can attend the conference but not the presentations for free. We have to pay to go to the presentations.

Lionel also reported that we have set a date for our next Living Well with Hearing Loss conference. It will be November 17, 2018 at the St. Louis Park Rec Center during our normal Saturday meeting.

Treasurer Marie Saliterman described a few instances of advocating for herself with beneficial outcomes, but also talked about how much harder it is to advocate for ourselves than for our loved ones and how much more emotional it is. She concluded that everyone needs to keep advocating and that if she could do it, anyone could.

During open mic, we were reminded that Messiah Church in Plymouth is celebrating one year of having a loop installed and will have a presentation by audiologist Juliette Sterkens as well as exhibitors and that we are invited to participate. This will take place Saturday, March 3 at 1 pm.

Lionel also reminded us that we will be electing officers in May and to start thinking about whether you would like to become a Board member.

Finally, our speaker schedule has changed and February's presenter will be Dr. Sam Levine from the University of Minnesota and VA Medical Center discussing tinnitus.

Lionel closed the meeting at noon.

Introducing our February Speaker



Dr. Samuel C. Levine, M. D.

Professor, Otolaryngology and Neurosurgery, University of Minnesota

“Tinnitus – What Little we Know”

In thirty years a physician develops some passions in the study of a specialty at a university. My first interests were to improve skull base surgery and implantable devices.

Along the way I listened to patients with cochlear implants, and those who had had loss of hearing from acoustic tumors. There were a few who expressed to me clearly that their tinnitus was unacceptable. So unacceptable that one of my patients committed suicide. I cannot recall a patient who had severe hearing loss who did not have tinnitus.

Several facts have impressed me. First, tinnitus is the most common complaint of returning vets and it costs the government more than any other single disability. Second, a large percentage of cochlear implant patients are helped not just for their hearing but they are significantly helped with their tinnitus.

Some solutions are now within reach. We just need to do the careful study to understand this better and to treat it.

Hope for Inclusiveness

Last month I saw the incomparable Harry Belafonte, activist, actor and singer, and more importantly, I HEARD him talk about his life and his time with Martin Luther King, Jr. Not only that, but I heard him better than many of the people sitting around me. How is that possible? How could a person with a severe hearing loss understand this icon better than people with normal hearing? Because the venue provided assistive listening devices (ALDs) with neck loops.

That venue is the House of Hope Presbyterian Church at 797 Summit Ave. in St. Paul. Mr. Belafonte was a guest on their Sunday Series, a forum that addresses social issues. It is moderated by their pastor, David Van Dyke, and is free and open to the public. I have attended a few of these presentations, and have been so impressed and so moved by the speakers that I intend to be there for as many as I can fit in my schedule. I am even more motivated now that I will be able to hear everything that is said.

It is important to note that House of Hope is not mandated by the ADA to provide ALDs. They are doing it to be inclusive. For quite some time, they have had ALDs with ear buds or a single headphone. Over the course of several months, I spoke with whomever would listen to me, including the sound technician and pastor, plus I wrote a follow-up letter, describing the need for induction loops for those who have cochlear implants as well as most people who wear hearing aids. I believe that members of their congregation also talked about loops. I am happy to say that the church now has two neck loops available that they are willing to check out with the ALDs to patrons for use during their religious services and the Sunday Series.

Their next Sunday Series is on May 20, 2018 at 2 pm in the sanctuary. These presentations are very popular, so come early to get a good seat and an ALD. If you have your own loop, I suggest bringing it in case they run out of neck loops. That is what I did the first few times I attended. It doesn't work perfectly, but is better than not having an ALD. You can check out their schedule and learn more about the church on their website, hohchurch.org. And did you notice the abbreviation? I like that it could also stand for the hard of hearing church since they have done so much to include us.
